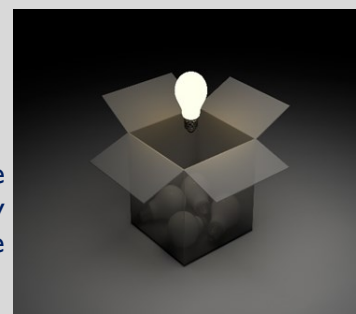

This has been a busy term for our exam students.

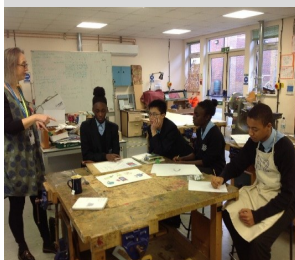
In order to help them focus on what career prospects in design might look like, we invited Nadine Bennet Senior lecturer in Product Design at Ravensbourne University to come in and work with them for a day. Her focus was to highlight some of the skills they should develop and would need for the future world of work.



Year 12 A level product designers were challenged to present their ideas for new products confidently and with conviction to a client looking at their ideas for the first time.

Year 12 IB students explored how important it was to develop products and ideas that reflected real needs of consumers and to think about how to adapt and design for a rapidly changing world.

Year 11 and 13 had their eyes opened to the range of businesses from banking to supermarket chains, oil companies and retail that were recruiting design graduates for their ability to solve problems, their creative and strategic thinking skills.



Innovation was the buzz word after the Year 10 lesson, they were so interested and Nadine was so impressed with them, she stayed for an extra design drawing session after lessons had finished for the day.

Nadine plans to return later in the term to give Year 10 and 12 coaching on their major design projects.

Jill Swan is a sculpture who, having bought her own woodland, then set up a business running workshops in carpentry and land conservation.

Year 12 IB and Year 10 product designers spent an afternoon experiencing first hand the qualities that make wood a popular material to make products with and some of the techniques to develop the quality of their work further.

Alexander the Great Lecture

On the 1st February after school, in SFCI, Professor Hugh Bowden Head of Classics at King's College, University gave a talk about Alexander the Great, famed historical ruler of the Macedon, and about the different historical interpretations and depictions. The talk was very interesting, and it was made all the more interesting by the evident passion Professor Bowden had for the subject matter. For example, he said that we know the exact date that Alexander the Great died, and this is due to a Babylonian Astronomical Journal (pictured) that says the king died.



Also, he said that he was often portrayed in a godlike way, as his friends wanted him remembered as a great ruler. However, the Romans depicted him as a corrupted leader with too much power, as this image was allegorical with the political climate at the time (Marc Antony and Augustus). He greatly increased my knowledge of Alexander the Great, while also improving my critical thinking with historical narratives, and the whole experience was thoroughly enjoyable.

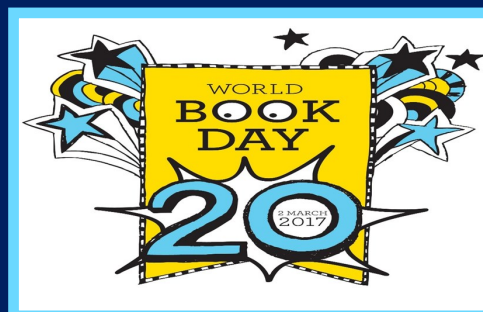
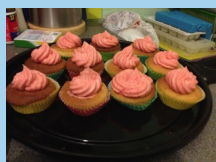


Library News
