On Wednesday we accompanied the Italians around Greenwich, seeing the Meridian line and the Cutty Sark, before taking a chilly riverboat trip to the South Bank then on to Covent Garden. To round off the visit, we enjoyed a dessert together at Creams, then said farewell to our students on the Friday morning. We are all very excited to be seeing them again, when we travel to Siena in April, where we can practise more of our Italian.

The film centres around Izumi, a thief and a criminal who ends up in a scenic mountain village, where he is welcomed by the elderly populace, who help him reassert himself with the fate and the world around him, thus beginning his story of redemption. The film features wonderful cinematography and captures the natural beauty of Japan's overwhelming mountain range. 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### Culture Club: <u>Amadeus</u>, The National Theatre, Wednesday 31<sup>st</sup> January 2018


Culture Club recently saw <u>Amadeus</u> at the National Theatre on the Southbank, and if you have seen any of the reviews already then you will already know, it was absolutely amazing! The play is about the talented musician, Antonio Salieri, and his deep-seated rivalry with Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. This play premiered in 1979, in fact at the National Theatre and received rave reviews that allowed it to achieve huge international success, being shown in Broadway only a year after. I really enjoyed this play, moving me to the edge of my seat, to laughter, and to being moved on a personal level by the amazing score, lifted straight from Mozart's most famous music pieces.

While I absolutely enjoyed all of the play, there were scenes that solidified the experience as easily one of the best theatrical experiences of my life. One of those was when Salieri first read Mozart's pieces at the end of Act I. This scene sets up the rest of the play perfectly and adds massive weight and development of Salieri's character, as in this scene, he renounced God and promised to fight him, through his rivalry with Mozart. Lucian Msamati, Salieri, was brilliant and was able to convey the inner conflict wracking Salieri's mind in a way that was amazing to watch. Coupled with a masterpiece of a score that picked up at the perfect time, meant that this scene was nigh on perfect.

The Culture Club crowd who were lucky enough to come to see this, all had a brilliant night. This show was absolutely amazing and I would thoroughly recommend it to anyone who enjoys theatre.


ALL students and staff will Drop Everything And Read at some point on World Book Day so students will need to have a book with them to read on that day.
