

late for a lesson because they're not sure of where the room is.


A map can help because it shows where all the different rooms are and you can easily see the quickest way to get there.

If you like science you could look to see where the science labs are.

Or if you think dinnertime is the best thing about school then you can look to see where the canteen is!



The Timetable

One of the first pieces of information you will be given in September will be your timetable. It's very important because it not only tells you which lessons you will have that day but it also gives you a clue about the equipment you will need to pack in your bag the night before. It also tells you

what time each lesson starts and finishes and in which room they will take place. If you haven't got a watch yet, it might be a good idea to buy one to practise telling the time and getting to places on time.



Usually the timetable will also let you know which teacher you will have for each subject. Instead of just one teacher, you're going to have to get used to ten or more different people being in charge of your classes!

Often, the timetable will have the teacher's initials next to the name of the lesson.

You will probably have 5 or 6 different subjects every day and some will be in special rooms. For example science will usually take place in a laboratory.

Your school has a two week timetable. So you will have to remember whether you are on week A or week B. If you forget you can look at the T.V. screen on the wall in reception.

Homework

Homework - ugh! No one likes it but it's just one of those things that you have to do and the more organised you are, the less amount of time you'll have to spend doing it.

In Year 7 you may start to get a lot more homework than you have been used to. Teachers will be stricter about getting it done and handed in on time too.

To help you do this, you will be given a planner where you can write down what you have to do and when it has to be finished by.



Why is homework important?

Homework is really important because it shows the teacher whether you've understood the work or not. It also means that you can cover more work than the time

allotted in a lesson in school.



Equipment

In primary school, most of the equipment you need is kept in the classroom. But at secondary school, you will be expected to have your own pencils and pens and you will have to carry them all around with you. There are lots of other things you might need too.

Breaking the rules!

Apologising
