## Manga Workshop at Japan Embassy

On Tuesday 21st May, our Year 8 Japanese class went to a manga workshop held by the Japanese Embassy. The session was run by Konami Kanata (the author of the 'Chi's Sweet Home' manga) and some members of the embassy. The workshop started with Konami explaining how she makes and draws her manga, and talked about the processes and materials she uses. The way that she makes her manga is using this process:

- 1. Draw the pictures in pencil
- 2. Go over the designs in pen
- 3. Rub out the pencil
- 4. Then add screentones (which is a type of sticky material which can be stuck onto the drawings to add shadows, detail, colours etc.)

After we'd learned how manga is drawn, we had a go ourselves. We were each given the start of a manga extract from 'Chi's Sweet Home', but some of the boxes were blank so we could fill them in with our own storylines, using the same methods and materials as a professional manga artist. Drawing manga was a new experience for some people, as many of us had only read manga and had never attempted drawing it ourselves. Some people had never even read a manga. Many people's drawings were better than others, and the members of the embassy came round and helped us whilst we were creating our own drawings. It was fun, and everyone really enjoyed it.



# DT Department Kingston University - Engineer Competition

On Friday, I went to Kingston University as I was a runner-up in the competition 'If you were an engineer, what would you do?'. After a tiring journey, we finally made it. I have never been in a University before and the environment was surreal. A Tour Guide took

us to the room where all students' letters and sketches of their inventions were displayed. The 211 people who made it to this stage (out of 48,000 entries nationwide!) were either shortlisted (which I was awarded with and a distinction), highly commended (congratulations to Lily Hewitt for receiving that award) or a winner. There were 192 runner ups and 19 winners! Considering these 211 people were from Reception Class up to Year 12, I feel it was quite an achievement to get this far!



I remember seeing my invention on the pin board and being very shocked to see MY work on there. I felt a sense of warmth and happiness that my work had not just got 2 stamps from my DT Teacher, but being displayed in the University! After looking at a variety of people's work, especially the winners, I went to the prototype room. Every year, about 3 inventions are actually made into prototypes!! I tried out a bicycle that pumps water from a well through a pipe when you cycle in reverse; a sink that can adjust to one's height from sensory movement and also a magnetic shirt that contains magnets that push the buttons together. It was so fun trying out other peoples' inventions!!

Finally, I ate my lunch in the really nice University Cafe and then headed home. I would like to congratulate Maddy Hosier and James Spatz, for also getting their work displayed at the University and becoming runner-ups. Also, I am really grateful that I was allowed to have this experience and it didn't just entertain and interest me, but also gave me a taste of what it feels like to live on campus!! I would like to thank Miss Francis for entering us in the competition, enabling us to enjoy this experience. I can't wait to enter again next year!

#### Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> June




Parents' Association
