Inspiring Careers in STEM

On Monday 25th November the whole school was off timetable for Power Day 2. The theme was Industry and Enterprise and Year 9 and 10 students completed a series of workshops delivered by a wide range of external providers.

The activities included cooking, architecture, engineering, outbreak simulations, police robotics, town planning and many more.

We were very grateful to have a huge number of ambassadors from various industries who visited the school and delivered these workshops. One was an ex- pupil Lydia Hyde, who now works with The Metropolitan Police.

Here is some of the students' feedback:

"As someone who's interested in the field, the session not only heightened my knowledge, but also gave me an opportunity as the session holders answered my question after the session and told me about something I can do in the future to help me if I want to get into the industry " - An anonymous comment about the Public Health England Outbreak Simulation.

Year 13s also completed the practical element of their coursework in both Physics and Chemistry. With over 80 students in total there was a real buzz across the science laboratories. Concentrations were calculated, gases collected, magnets propelled and spheres were levitated in a dazzling array of scientific endeayour.

Why do I say this you may ask... As though WW1 had barbaric tolls in Belgium as in much of Europe, individuals from many different cultures and religions across the world suffered that same dreadful death and loss.

PREVENTING PERSONAL THEFT

DON'T LET A PICKPOCKET SPOIL YOUR DAY

Keep your wits about you and your valuables out of sight







PREVENTING PERSONAL THEFT

Pickpockets work in busy or crowded locations where they can be in close proximity to people without being noticed. Pickpockets often operate in pairs and use distraction techniques to avert your attention while they steal from you. Following this simple advice will help you avoid becoming a victim of pickpockets:

- Be aware of what is happening around you, especially when you are in new locations or situations.
- Carry your bag close to you and so that it opens facing you, not away from you. If you carry your bag over your shoulder, or on your back, you could be more of a target.
- Make sure your wallet or purse is not visible.

- If you use a wheelchair, motorised scooter, or you are pushing a pram, keep bags containing valuables in front of you.
- Be discreet with your belongings; displaying expensive jewellery or electronic devices, like mobile phones or cameras, could attract unwanted attention.

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
