



The *Qingming* Festival 清明节 also called Tomb Sweeping Day 扫墓, also referred to as the Pure Brightness Festival, pays respect to ancestors and celebrates the warming weather of spring. It is a time to honour the past in a celebratory manner that allows for both reflection and renewal on the 105th day after the Winter Solstice 冬至, which is around the 4th/5th of April. This tradition started in the Zhou Dynasty (1046–221 BC), and has a history of over 2,500 years.



In Chinese, Qingming (清明) means 'clearness' and 'brightness'. The origin of the name is related to the weather in this season. At the beginning of April, it becomes noticeably warmer and brighter in northern/central China (this happens earlier in south China). People start to wear light clothes and walk outside to feel the spring atmosphere.

All of the BGS Chinese learners from KS3 to KS5 had a great time celebrating the Qingming Festival in the classroom with their friends with cultural activities, including Spring outing 踏春, parachute throwing and making spring rolls 春卷.

"I learnt that the Chinese family hold the afterlife in high regards, and respect their ancestors and passed loved ones a lot". Ruth Yehualashet

"I found the lesson learning about the Qingming festival very enjoyable. I liked the fact that we got to try and make food that is a traditional part of the festival as well as learning a lot about it. I would definitely recommend learning about this festival to others as well as learning about other traditional Chinese festivals. My favourite part of the lesson was getting to

go outside and throw the parachutes up in the air as it was fun and it was fun to do with my friends. I also enjoyed watching the videos and learning about the because I didn't know what it was before the lesson. I learnt that people give gifts to those they have lost. I found that very interesting. "Today we experienced some of the Chinese traditions in the QingMing Festival. We had wraps with rice paper which was to be put in hot water in order to eat. Inside we put pasta with cheese or tomatoes. I picked cheese. We also played with kites outside which i enjoyed the most and we played a game to see whose kite would go higher. Traditionally, in China they would sweep the graves of their ancestors who passed away to show appreciation and love. Next time I would like to know what other activities they did to show their appreciation to the dead. Overall, I really enjoyed this Festival because I experienced lots of new activities and played games". **Elizaveta Newton**

"This lesson helped to teach me about how important these festivals are. We took part in various activities, including making spring rolls (with cold fillings because fire isn't allowed on this day), throwing parachutes and trying traditional Chinese rice sweets - which I was to try but I would recommend. I really enjoyed the parachute throwing because we got to go outside and it was funny when it flew away and we had to run to catch it. I would recommend learning about this festival because it broadens your knowledge about Chinese culture and the importance behind it". **Scarlett Barber**

"I think it is good to learn a bit about the culture of the language you are learning. It is respectful and can help you understand more. The Chinese festival, QingMing, was very interesting. They eat special food, go to the graves of ancestors, tidy it up by sweeping and then burn paper gifts they think their ancestors would like, such as paper money. It informs us that they believe that everyone should be loving and grateful towards their family. In the Western World, people such as myself, will say "I love you" to my family. Whereas in China, they show it through their actions, such as taking care of them when they are old. The QingMing festival is very fun, but teaches us good morals". **Samuel Ojeabulu**

"Celebrating the QingMing or Pure Brightness festival helped shed light on the care Chinese people give to their deceased family members. On this festival, Chinese people commemorate their deceased ancestors by sweeping the grave and burning pieces of paper in order to fulfil their needs in heaven. During our Chinese class, we learnt about the origins of this major festival and made some traditional food indicative of what Chinese households would eat on this day. As always, we learnt some relevant vocabulary and how they interlinked with the words we already knew. Nonetheless, the festival was fun and interesting". **Majeed Shakeel** (基尔)

"Today, we learnt about the 清明节 (Festival of Pure Brightness). It was extremely interesting and eye-opening. The entire class we're excited when we saw that we were doing a cultural lesson as they are always fun. The Qingming festival is a 3 day holiday when loving children pay respects to their dead ancestors. They sweep the graves, burn incense and paper items then go on an outing where they fly their kites and spend time with their family. They traditionally eat cold food on the day. We made a spring roll each and ate glutinous rice rolls. These festivals are very interesting and always one of the more enjoyable lessons". **Rifad Shahul Hameed**

"This lesson was a lot of fun as we were able to experience Chinese culture whilst learning about the Chinese vocabulary that was related to the Qingming Festival. It was also very fun to make the spring rolls and play with the parachutes outside; of course eating the sweets were nice as well. 
Geographical Easter activities





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Book Review

Time Travelling with a Hamster, by Ross Welford

Time Travelling with A Hamster, by Ross Welford, is a strange and wonderful book that showed us how young Al Chaudhury was dedicated to saving his (dead) father's life and how he finally managed to save his father from dying in his youth.

The story begins in a time when Al is the loneliest and has no friends. His mother has recently remarried and he hates his new step-sibling, Carly, who is a year ahead in his new school. On Al's 12th birthday, Carly does not join to celebrate, but he receives a hamster. His step-father names the hamster Alan Shearer. He also gets a letter from his late father. This tells him about a time-machine and how Al could save his father by taking away obstacles from a road in 1984, as this is what had slowly killed him.

He doesn't believe this at first but tries to attempt the mission as per his dad's instructions. He keeps figuring out ways he could cover up his secret activities. As he no longer lives in the house where the time-machine is located, he steals his Grandpa Byron's moped to get there and breaks into the old garage. His first attempt at time travel fails.

After a few attempts he meets a neighbour and hesitantly asks the suspicious man what year it is. Coming and going through the time machine, he meets a group of delinquents who burn a cat. He befriends one of them and time travels to save the cat with help from the younger neighbour he'd met earlier. He soon finds out Chow, his friend, is actually Pythagoras Chaudhury, his father! By mistake, he ends up getting one of the delinquents to kill (again!) his father by damaging the road on that day.

He ends up in a time dimension where his father was dead and his mother married a police officer. He peeks out of the time machine to see his step-sister but she does not recognise him. He is forced to run away and reaches his old home to see his Grandfather only unfortunately he is not the same person and they do not get along well. He goes back in time for the last time and gives his father a letter while no one notices and travels back to the future.

He does eventually get to fulfil what he dreamed of, and meets his father along with a hamster. His father sees him and calls Al's by his fake name from 1984, they hug and his father tells him about how the hamster is a descendant of Alan Shearer, who Al left as a gift for his father in a different dimension, all those years ago:

love the fact that the book has a time machine, a hamster and lots of thrilling challenges and time travel for the protagonist. At the same time it is also funny in places and warm with beautiful relationships like between Al and his grandpa and with his mother and father.

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


