

Ex-BGS student publishes future bestseller!

The new and exciting entrant in YA fiction, the author Finn Longman, brought one of their most intricate pieces of crime riddling thriller to Bexley Grammar school on Monday 31st January. They discussed with their audience of eager English Language students the journeys of finally being a published writer after 12 years of writing drafts from their teenage years and how they found different writing styles and genres. Trying to relocate peace in the chambers of writing and reinvent the modern crime genre, their mission is to get rid of the typical "attractive female protagonist romance" stigma that has suddenly plagued all modern authors to write about to make the book "sellable" and market it better to younger audiences. They say that this book, as well as an attempt at removing said stigma, was also a way of expressing their feelings towards certain bits of injustice in society, although they have mentioned that some things which are in the book were intentional, and others not so much

Finn also talked to us about how they approach world-building in writing and the way they

found the made-up language of Esperanto as well as it being a driving factor for the town's name and the language the characters spoke in the book. Finally, Finn gave us a very early taste of the book "The Butterfly Assassin" (codenamed the Dark Butterfly in its early stages). The book is about a secret assassin programme for minors in which the protagonist, Isabel Ryans, has been part of since a little girl. Living in the fictional city of Espera, a top-secret ammunition site built after WW2, the two rival organisations which control the city are being attracted by this unaffiliated killer who is cold-bloodedly roaming the streets and wanting to recruit her into their organisation. Despite this, Isabel wants to live a normal life but after running away from home she meets a new friend which for the first time in ages gives her hope. Will the blood on her hands cost her everything? You can find out when the book will gracefully land on the 26th of May 2022 and is available for pre-order on most book-selling platforms.

The event is run by the National Cyber Security Centre; the branch of the Security Service tasked with keeping the UK safe from computer threats. The competition was hosted at the National Air Traffic Services headquarters near Portsmouth and the BGS team went up against 11 other schools from the South East.

The competition involved a gruelling day-long series of

challenges to crack codes, solve puzzles and find hidden messages. The crown was ultimately claimed by Highgate School in North London, but BGS were definitely hot on their heels - at one point our team were running second on the leader board. The girls showed incredible drive and determination as well as amazing teamwork. Well done to all four!

Cybersecurity is a career field that currently has more than 30,000 unfilled vacancies in the UK alone, and women account for just 16% of the workforce. The NCSC runs the CyberFirst Girls competition for Year 8 girls each year to encourage more girls to consider this as a career path.

Swimming

Every year there is an event for swimming called the Kent Swimming Championship (KSC) where all the swimming clubs in Kent and all their fast swimmers compete in races to see who the fastest swimmer is. The KSC had been cancelled for 2 years due to COVID so this was the first KSC in 3 years and it was a pretty big event! I ended up winning 4 gold medals, 4 silvers and a bronze medal. Overall out of 14 races and I managed to get into the finals in every one of them (the finals are the fastest 8 swimmers from the previous heats in your age group), but for some I came 4th and 5th. I'm also pretty sure I won the most gold medals for my age group which is 13, however, I'm not 13 until May compared to others who have already turned 13. I managed to win a gold medal for the 200 Butterfly, 400 Individual Medley, 400 Front Crawl, 200 Backstroke and silver medals for the 200 Front Crawl, 100 Butterfly, 800 Front Crawl and 1500 Front Crawl. I also won a bronze for the 50 Backstroke. The difference between all of bronze for the 50 Backstroke. The difference between all of these races and me getting golds were milliseconds which was quite annoying. All of these races are long distances which are my best races because when swimming I have high stamina and a good technique meaning I can swim fast for a long time, but compared to others who have muscle and speed they would be better in the short distance races where I would be worse.

LGBTQ+ History Month





Heartstopper - Alice Oseman










The Song of Achilles - Madeline Miller
