Design & Technology News

Real recycling at BGS

Following on from our Easter magazine article, we wanted to share an update on our 'real recycling' project in Design & Technology. Inspired by the new trend for real recycling on a small scale and to link with our Year 9 curriculum theme of sustainability, we have continued with the project to teach our students how to recycle unwanted plastic, using equipment found in most households. Over the past few terms, students and staff have been busy collecting bottle tops made from HDPE (High Density Polyethylene), a plastic that is easy to heat and reshape. The first step in the process was to collect enough bottle tops for students to form into thin sheets of new plastic. To do this we ran a house competition to see which house could collect the most with Kirkman winning first prize! Using a variety of different coloured bottle tops gave us some stunning multi-coloured sheets. The students then used workshop tools to cut and shape them into various small items such as keyrings and pendants.

We are really excited to develop this project further and would encourage you to collect up (and clean) your unwanted bottle tops so that we can run this project again next year and develop an even wider range of products.

If you would like to collect bottle tops we ask that you check the underside of the lid to make sure it is made from HDPE. The easiest way to do this is to look out for this symbol:

Design Ventura

Last term, Year 9 students took part in the Design Ventura Competition. This is an annual, international enterprising competition where students answer a live brief set by The Design Museum, in association with Deutsche Bank. The brief was to design a product that could be sold in the Design Museum shop and appeal to one of the following user groups: Adult design enthusiasts, young people and students or families.

Other considerations were to design a product that was sustainable, could improve everyday life in some way and could be made for no more than £7 and sold for up to £15.

The students started by researching their user groups needs and wants so that they could develop a product with real value. They then had to look at the type of products that sell in the Design Museum shop, which gave them a real insight into the types of products they would need to design to fit in with what is already available. Once they had sketched out some initial ideas they had to share these within their groups and work together to decide on which ideas best suited the needs of the user group. They also used lots of primary research techniques to gather feedback from real people that fitted into their chosen user group.

The final parts of the project saw the students spend time developing a final prototype as well as create ideas for marketing their product and budgeting for materials and planning how it could be made commercially.

The project was challenging as it was a completely open brief which meant that the students, whilst working in their groups had to take full ownership of every part. In comparison to other projects where students are given an intended outcome to work towards, this was a completely new experience for them. However, they worked very hard and gained valuable insight into the world of design and business.

The winning team's idea was to create a set of beeswax wraps for families to use when packaging food. A sustainable alternative to cling film and sandwich bags, this product not only looked good but was very sustainable, making use of natural textiles and beeswax. Thousands of students from across the globe take part in this project every year so just to have their work submitted is a real achievement which they should be very proud of, as are we in the Design & Technology Department!


