THINKING

Thinking Black Creative Writing Prize

Earlier this year, I was selected from a range of Black students from all over the country to participate in the "Thinking Black Creative Writing Prize" for Year 10s which is a programme run by Jesus College and New College of Oxford University. The programme consisted of 6 weeks of online training every Saturday from 10-12 am. Across the weeks, the training sessions Congratulations! every Saturday from 10-12 am. Across the weeks, the training sessions included teaching for the styles of writing, poetry, plays and prose and other sessions where we wrote drafts and tried to extend our writing which was marked by other students of Oxford and published authors.

All the topics related to black individuals and we studied more about our history from the foundations of African/Caribbean literature (like folklore of

history from the foundations of African/Caribbean literature (like folklore the gods) to Windrush, post migration literature and works about the diaspora. We would analyse each text and have class discussions on them. Then we received our prompts to base our entries on: "Black" by Dave or an excerpt from a speech by Michelle Obama. We wrote our drafts for submission in June and submitted the final pieces in July after editing with some feedback. Each category had their overall winners who would win a workshop with *United Agents* (a literary and talent agency), cash prizes, trophies, publication in an online anthology and a celebration day at Oxford. *United Agents* publish elite authors like David Olusoga, Benjamin Zepahania, David Attenborough and Stephen Hawking. I happened to come first place in my section, prose, and attended the workshop at *United Agents* in August which was amazing. I met the agents, went on a tour of the building and had a very informative Q&A session

went on a tour of the building and had a very informative Q&A session with them. It made the idea of working in a company like theirs seem very appealing, especially the prospect of free books most of your life and going to a wide range of premieres (as they also make book to film adaptations and film to book)!

I will be going to Oxford in October for the award ceremony. I will be given a tour of the colleges and meet a panel of current and former students who will discuss how to get into Oxford. I would recommend this programme for any black Year 10 students looking to extend their writing while gaining valuable experiences!


Economics & Business Book Review

Why the Germans Do It Better

John Kampfner's "Why the Germans Do It Better" is an eye-opening book about Germany's transition from the ruins of World War II to the modern day with a deep analysis of the German economy, political system, and people. For a book that's title focuses on Germany, it was also very informative about the UK, especially how the UK has handled the same issues as Germany, and how the two countries' similar systems have had different results. I learnt a lot about the successes and failures of both countries and the political and economic policies that achieved them. 

This year's shortlisted books, chosen from over 200 submissions, represent the very best in popular science writing from around the world for a non-specialist audience.



Prachi Thapa wins U14 Stephen Spender Translation Prize 2022!

The competition

The Stephen Spender Prize is an annual competition for poetry in translation run by the prestigious Stephen Spender Trust, which champions multilingualism and literary translation through a range of initiatives.

This year the judges included award winning poet Daljit Nagra, Samantha Schnee, founding editor of Words Without Borders' and Khairani Barokka, an Indonesian writer, artist, and translator.

Prachi's translation

Prachi translated 送杜少府之任蜀州, 王勃 ("Farewell To Vice-Prefect Du Setting Out For His Official Post In Shu"), by Wang Bo.

Original text in Mandarin:

城阙辅三秦, 风烟望五津。 与君离别意, 同是宦游人。 海内存知己, 天涯若比邻。 无为在岐路, 儿女共沾巾。



Translation:

Through this wall that surrounds the three Qin districts, Through a mist that makes five rivers one, I am filled with sadness that we should have to part, We are two officials going opposite ways.... And yet, while China holds our friendship, And heaven remains our neighbourhood, Let us not wallow in sorrow as our paths separate, And cry without hesitation like the young at home.

Prachi's commentary

I think to understand this poem, you must know the feeling of letting go of a person you hold dear in your heart. You don't want to say goodbye but deep in your mind, you know that it is time for you to move on, you may never find someone like them again, but you will meet someone else. And then, the places you walked together are forever stored in your heart and the history of the place. In Mandarin, there are a lot of meanings to one word, you could take it literally or not so that it makes more sense. For example, the word 服务员 literally translates to service professional person but to make it simple, it means attendant. A lot of Chinese poems refer to the history behind China. Line 1 refers to the Qin Dynasty, the first dynasty in Ancient China and Line 5 displays how something as simple as the place we are holds memories of us and what we did there. Another hard thing was that because some words have no literal meaning while searching for several translations of the last line, it had resulted in children searching for towels. When I found a more suitable translation that fit the theme of the poem well, I instead used that.

Dear Habiteers (I like to think that there is a group of you out there awaiting my next article; please don't shatter this illusion!).

Responses to the **anonymous survey** continue to come in. I was delighted to learn more from

the student who said that a small change in habit had led to some significant differences in their life. They got back in touch to say a little more. Celebrate with me as we hear that the change has continued, and learn more from this hero of habits:

"I've been sticking with my routine and, in case you're wondering what the trigger to my bad behaviour was, it was simply me having my phone on. At the start of the academic year, I told myself that I could only use my phone after doing my homework and have kept it in my blazer until I've finished. I've intentionally made it harder for myself to want to use my phone by keeping it locked and zipped and I think other people should try it as well, as in just a couple of days, you will genuinely see yourself feel more productive and be filled with less regret at the end of the day."

Little change - big difference! Do *you* have a story to share?

You are feeling sleepy...

Another response to the survey was from someone who is now "going to sleep earlier". This is a habit that will reap huge benefits if they are able to keep it up. Sleep is something that is essential to almost every creature on earth. We're so vulnerable when asleep that evolution wouldn't have kept sleep as a behaviour if we didn't really need it to survive and function. We still don't know or understand everything we want to regarding sleep, but most of us know how much better we are after a few good nights of sleep.

So, how are you doing with sleep?

The ideal amount of sleep for teenagers is 8-10 hours a night, and 7-9 hours for adults (see the <u>Sleep Foundation's website</u> for more). Lots of us don't get nearly that much, and this is something to work on. According to the founder of the Sleep Foundation - neuroscientist and psychologist Matthew Walker - "Sleep is the single most important thing you can do to reset the health of your brain and body." Sounds important, right?

Sadly, bumping up the amount of sleep you get each night requires bigger changes to your routine than zipping your phone away until homework is done. Each of us has a whole sequence of habits that make up our evening routines, and there might be a lot of unpacking of those before you consistently manage an earlier bedtime. It will be worth it, but it will take work.

This is the challenge I offer you: consider how much sleep you currently manage each night and aim to build that by one hour, every night, by Christmas.

How might you do that? This article is not long enough to go into everything that you might want to try, so I'm going to have to keep it brief and point you in other directions.

> The Sleep Foundation has a whole list of suggestions to follow for a bedtime routine and even offers a 14-day programme to support those who might need it (there doesn't *appear* to be a charge for this, but I make no promises).

Inner Drive, one of my favourite sources of useful science and research, offers some similar advice but with a more student-focused approach.



Some habits are worth the effort, and improving the quantity and quality of your sleep is definitely worth it. Now, it's over to you.






Bexley Grammar School Rocketry Club





Notice for Year 7 Parents/ Carers MidYIS Test

On Thursday 6th October, all year 7 pupils will sit a computer based MidYIS test. No revision or preparation is required from the pupils in any way. Many secondary schools countrywide give students some sort of a baseline assessment on entry.

The MidYIS test is designed to measure pupils' developed ability rather than what has been taught previously in school. MidYIS assesses four key areas which research shows are linked to later academic outcomes:

- Vocabulary word fluency and understanding
- Mathematics logical thinking, manipulating numbers and numerical concepts
- Non-verbal ability recognising shapes, matching patterns, applying spatial awareness and visual intuition
- Skills such as proofreading, perceptual speed and accuracy

As the assessment is adaptive, each student sees a unique assessment and is challenged at a level that is suitable for them, making it enjoyable, engaging, and efficient. The school uses both MidYIS baseline data, along with Key Stage 2 data, to reflect on the individual progress of students, as they move through the school, and to adapt teaching and offer support where needed. How to apply for free school meals

You can apply for your children to receive free schools meals if you are receiving certain welfare benefits.

All children get free school meals if they are in reception, year 1 or year 2. If you receive any of the benefits below you should still apply so that the school gets extra funding.

This money could go towards things like learning support and after-school activities.

Am I eligible?

You must already be receiving any of the following benefits to apply:

- · Income Support
- · Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- · Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- · The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided you are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenue & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
- Working Tax Credit 'run-on' the payment someone may receive for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit you must annually take home £7,400 or less in Universal Credit
 payments. This equals an average of £616.67 per month in net earned income (after
 deductions).

You are not eligible for free school meals if you receive Working Tax Credit or other support payments that are not mentioned above.

Greenwich

If your child attends a school in another borough you will need to apply to the relevant council or school directly. APPLY TO BEXLEY

Tower Hamlets

Children whose parents live in the borough but who attend schools outside the borough. Parents should apply to the authority where the school is located. APPLY TO BEXLEY.

Medway

Does not specify the location of the school and just has a link to applications.

Bromley

If your child attends a non-Bromley school, you must apply to the local authority where the school is situated. APPLY TO BEXLEY.

Dartford

If your child attends a non-Dartford school, you must apply to the local authority where the school is situated. APPLY TO BEXLEY.

When these applications are completed a notification should be sent to the school for us to update records accordingly but may be worth the parents sending in the email confirmation to us too.
