They have all been issued with a 'Free Time Friend' badge so easy to spot.




OX?PLORE

Dear Habiteers,

Reading seems to be the new trend among our... readers..., with recent respondents reporting more time spent with books. Here is one response that I particularly liked, which fits with the encouragement to put phones away, the initial tip to make changes small at first, and the idea of taking an old habit and making it better:

"I have kept my routine the same, but in times where I would be on my phone (doing nothing productive) I've decided to instead do reading - it's the same principle, but reading books is helping me learn more about my subjects and the career I want in the future. Definitely more productive."

Snoozing on cold, dark mornings

The first frost of autumn appeared this morning at BGS, glistening on the roofs of the buildings I look down on from my office window. It has heralded a gloriously sunny day, but it makes it more difficult to get out of a warm bed in the morning. The creeping darkness doesn't help most of us, either. Well, strange as it might seem, one of my first thoughts in the morning when my alarm goes off is that to hit 'snooze' would be to betray you. Hitting the snooze button means denying that first cue of the day, the one that is supposed to get me out of bed. Therefore, I turn off my alarm and get out of bed, not wanting to let you down by failing to practise what I preach. Remember: ignoring the cues you have given yourself to improve your behaviour becomes a habit in itself, and then forming better habits becomes ever more difficult. Can you avoid snoozing this winter?

Positive thinking

Have you ever reflected on the fact that bad things tend to stick in the mind more than the good? Sadly, this seems to be a biological throwback to when humans (or our ancestors) faced significant evolutionary pressures. From a survival perspective, it makes a lot of sense to remember things that have threatened us, because then we might be more likely to survive them in the future. The same is less true for positive things. Therefore, if we want to think more positively, it might be necessary to build up a habit of doing so. How?

In my third article I suggested a daily review of lesson content to support learning. How about a different sort of review (or an add-on, if a daily review is already habitual)? Write down one thing (or two, or three) that was good in your day. This doesn't have to be huge, just positive. Did you have a good chat with a friend? Did something stick in a lesson where previously you'd struggled? Was lunch tasty? Did you hand in all of your work on time? Small things that make life better are worth noting and celebrating. The more frequently you do this, the more positives you will notice, no matter what else is going on in your life. If you write them down, you will build up a record of the nicer side of life, and that's got to be worth having, right?

I hope that you have a week full of positives that you remember, and find something nice to make up for getting up when it's cold and dark!





Bexley Grammar School Rocketry Club


