
Black History Month

A Day at Kew Gardens ~ Year 9 Geography

On Tuesday 18th October, the French side of Year 9 went on a geography trip to the Royal Botanic Gardens in Kew, Richmond-upon-Thames. Though the trip took the whole school day, I'd say I had quite a bit of fun on this.

So what exactly did we do? Once we got there, we were sorted into our groups and sent to look at certain parts of the gardens. We first went into the Hive, which to our surprise, was very modernistic in its design - as well as that, we also learnt the interesting fact that honeybees actually hum in the key of C.

As well as learning facts about animals that we may not know otherwise, we also learnt some facts about plants as well, such as about this plant, *Quercus turneri*, known as *Turner's Oak*.

After that, we went to the renowned Princess of Wales Conservatory, where we got to experience the biodiversity of several different biomes - among some, arid desert, tropical rainforest and temperate. There were over 12,000 specimens, and there was so much to explore that for a brief period of time, my friends and I were separated from our guide. Among the wonderful things, I saw the three





types of waterlilies: *Victoria boliviana, Victoria amazonica* and *Victoria cruziana*. The first was discovered earlier this year. We were also very surprised to see aguamarine life underneath the lilies.

Next was the walkway. Due to my fear of heights, this was probably my least favourite part of the journey, but others seemed to be having fun. In hindsight, it was quite cool to look down and see trees that you'd crane up to on the ground surface.

We then explored a place known as the Temperate House, where we learnt about plant life in the Americas and some parts of Australia. While there, we learnt about a type of tree whose nectar is scarlet-red: Nesocodon mauritianus.

We then gathered up for lunch and while the view of the lake was nice, some of us were harassed by nearby seagulls wanting food. The last few places we visited were quite memorable - we visited the *Palm House*, which despite the name, was surprisingly humid and warm.

There, we learnt about some plants and fruit that are grown in this type of biome - an example is the papaya, which is known by many names across the world. As well as that, we discovered that in humid biomes such as the Palm House, there are some plants which can help with

certain diseases, like quinine for malaria. (As well as that, we saw the Water Lily House. It was really pretty, but there is little to mention about it that hasn't been mentioned in the Princess of Wales Conservatory.)

After that, we boarded the coach and headed back to school. This was a really fun activity and granted that this was our first ever school trip, I'd say this is an excellent start!
