
A Message from Mr Gilmore, Headteacher, to Year 6 Pupils 2023




ROYAL SOCIETY YOUNG PEOPLE'S SCIENCE BOOK PRIZE Year 7&8 Competition

Wyatt Knox-Newman, who sorted through our hundreds of costumes to put together pieces appropriate to the 1920s;


Mollie Arkwright, who kept everything running with set and props backstage;
