



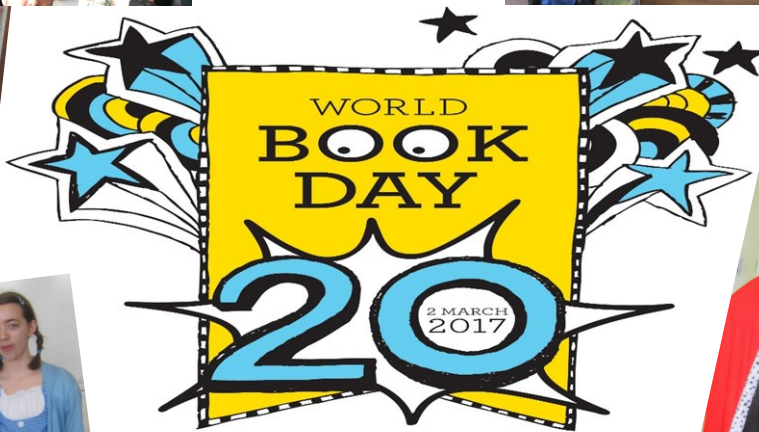

Sicily 2017

Our trip started with arriving at school at the very early time of 2.45 am! Everyone was tired and I think most of us slept on our way to Heathrow; I did myself. When we arrived at the airport, we checked in for 2 flights. Unfortunately, I was feeling very sick before and during the flight, leading to my sleeping at every opportunity I could. However, once we arrived in Catania, Sicily, after the flights, I felt much better, so I could enjoy the interesting town. When we got there we went and saw our first Roman Theatre, of the many we saw on this trip, where we could even see the 'backstage' area, tunnels leading under the seats and discovered that a 17th Century home had been built right onto the theatre. We walked around the town, where, like English people do, we bought chips instead of anything Italian! Soon after, we got on a coach to Hotel Lachea, our first hotel. When dinner arrived, we were all starving, but as the many, Italian courses kept coming and coming, soon we became full. Then it was time to finally go to bed and sleep.



The next morning, we woke up fairly early, quickly ate breakfast and got back on the coach to go and explore more of Sicily. We started the day by visiting a theatre and quarry. The teachers told us all about the Odeon, what it had been used for and the catacombs under the quarry. We also befriended a dog who was admiring the theatre too. Next, we went to see a large villa, the floors of which were covered in elaborate mosaics. It had some of the best preserved mosaics, depicting chariot races, hunts and scenes from famous myths. After an amazing lunch (from which we came back with piles of pizza boxes, most of which ended up with Mr Risdon), we had a long coach ride to our next hotel. Looking out the coach window, we could see the beautiful Sicilian countryside which seemed to be covered in orange trees. On arriving at the hotel, we relaxed in our rooms and found the only English channel on the TV (although the programmes were awful).

Day 3 was definitely the hottest day of them all and also when we saw the most amazing temples. From our hotel, we went to the valley of temples, which was very high up and so we could see amazing views. We explored the Temple of Hera, Concordia, Hercules, Zeus and Castor and Pollux. The Temple of Concordia was definitely the most impressive, as most of the temple was still standing. We could see most of the details here. The huge Temple of Zeus, when it was being built, was never finished, but we could still look at statues of Atlas which would have 'held up' the temple. The story of Castor and Pollux related to the Gemini the most, like me. It is said that when Castor died, his twin brother Pollux was so sad to be separated that he decided to give up his immortality. Zeus, the father of Castor and Pollux felt pity on them and placed the brothers in heaven to make up the constellation of Gemini. After the brilliant valley of the temples we looked around a museum, but, shortly, it was time to return to the hotel, for a quiz and dinner, after another very busy day.

Our fourth day in Sicily took us first to Syracuse, where we saw the ruins of an old fort, overlooking the harbour. Here, we got to go through a labyrinth of dark underground tunnels which lead us to somewhere that might have been a dungeon (or a storage room). Next, we went to the little island of Ortigia where we saw a great Cathedral that had been built over an ancient temple. We returned to the coach to visit the next site. On the way, Miss Fisher told us some brilliant myths about Cyclops and tyrants of Sicily. At the next place, we saw the largest Greek theatre in Sicily - needless to say, it was huge. After that, we looked at another quarry which was even bigger and had some not-so-nice history. There was a cave called 'the ear of Dionysius' which, from the outside, you could hear everything that was going on inside. This was connected to one of the myths Miss Fisher had told us about the paranoid tyrant, Dionysius. Finally, when we returned to our original hotel, we all performed in a "talent" show.

Unfortunately, our final day in Sicily soon arrived. We quickly packed and headed out to an extremely ancient town called Naxos. There, we could see the ruins of old houses, the strong city wall and a kiln. Our last place to visit was the town of Taormina, which we had to take a shuttle bus up to because of its high location. We wandered through the town until we got to the main spectacle, our final theatre. This theatre was definitely the most impressive. Its decorated columns still stood behind the stage and it had such a beautiful view - even when cloudy, we could vaguely see Mount Etna. Once we had wandered around the town, eating our last slices of pizza, we headed to Catania airport and once again embarked on two flights until we reached Heathrow and then Bexley Grammar at 1.00 am. We said our goodbyes and travelled home after a truly amazing trip.

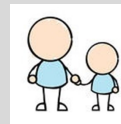
