

The IB aims to create 'the all-round' student and one that can reflect. Here is the reflection of a student for her involvement in an Open Evening where she was representing the Languages **Department:** 'Sometimes you never fully understand your own passions until you're asked to instil that passion in another person. Obviously, after having chosen to study both German and Italian at higher level for the IB, I was aware that I have a passion for languages, or at the very least I have a pleasant time learning them. However it wasn't until this open evening, as complete strangers wandered in to scrutinize my school's language department, that I realised just how much I've enjoyed my language lessons every week for the past 5 years, and how much I wanted these young children to have the same experience. Before the arrival of the parents and children, I was nervous,

and sure that I would be tongue-tied the second a question was directed my way. But this was definitely not the case and towards the end of the evening I had to make a conscious effort to keep my passionate ranting to a minimum as the parents had a lot of other departments to visit!



I also developed an understanding of how different education is for my generation compared to the education of my parents' generation, for example. As language teachers such as Mr Dufton outlined the course and all of the different options available at BGS, I noted that many parents seemed taken aback by the wide variety of languages offered here, and a fair few of them commented on their own basic education that had been limited to only learning French, with no choices or freedom. If anything, this allowed me to become more confident in my own belief of the importance of learning languages, and more determined to convince these children to attend Bexley Grammar. On the back of this confidence boost, I worked with some other volunteers at the Open Evening to provide stimulating and interesting language-based games for the children, and many of them were keen to join in and impress their parents with their new found knowledge!

Overall I believe that we were very successful, judging by the abundance of positive feedback from both parents and children.'

Many of our students undertook The Challenge (NCS) - a national charity whose mission is to connect and inspire people to strengthen their communities, bringing together local people across all generations, ethnic groups and incomes to build a stronger society.

One student reflected on her involvement in the Challenge 'I feel more confident speaking and being in new social situations than I was before and I have confidence in my abilities to overcome challenges I set myself. After Part I I could honestly say that I had made some good friends which was an awe-some feeling. Not only had I overcome personal challenges but my actions had had a positive impact on other people's lives too; I supported my team members and encouraged them to push their comfort zone like I had done to feel even better afterwards. I found I have a strength in supporting people and this encouraged me to put myself forward more for leadership roles later in the NCS programme and I am so glad I persevered with NCS and have been able to gain so much from the experience.'

A Year 13 IB student actually designed the official 90th Anniversary badge for 12th Erith Scouts, it was attached to the children's uniforms to commemorate the anniversary.



Four of students in Year 13 experienced a fantastic opportunity of being involved in the Dame Kelly Holmes Trust Programme AQA Unlocking Potential, which aims to motivate and inspire young people to discover and develop their strengths and to make the most of their potential.

Debate Club is a student led club. Here is one student's reflection on their meetings: 'Debate Society has been the most intellectual of my CAS projects, and it has also been brilliant fun! I have learned a lot from working with my fellow enthusiasts; learning to explain my points and defend myself in the face of (fairly staunch) opposition. I have found myself at times very engrossed in the issues discussed and before many of the weeks I found myself mentally preparing my stance and viewpoint; in order to make sure I was not outspoken by other, more prepared members.

It was a very interesting experience to discuss topics that affect people across the globe, not just in Britain: for example; discussing the significance of the global military in the middle-east came up a few times was enlightening to discuss and fuelled some of the arguments I made in my Extended Essay about US intervention in Iraq.

I also learnt how to prepare a session of discussion by running the sessions on childhood obesity and mental health: after both of which; the side I was representing had the majority vote. It was challenging to prepare these sessions as I had to make sure the facts were separate from the arguments and that my own opinion was apart from the main body of the presentation.

In summary; taking part in the Debate Society has been an intellectually stimulating experience and I have developed many skills that will be necessary for my university career.'



Two of our students are passionately involved with Air Cadets, one of them received the award for "Cadet of the Year". Part of his reflection read: 'Overall I can say that this was definitely one of the best things I have done as part of Cadets and I will look back on it for a very long time.' Supervisors review students' involvement in their CAS events, his supervisor wrote: 'His excellent attendance and commitment to external activities saw him win the annual award of 'Best Cadet' and consequently led to further promotion of

sergeant which should see him working towards helping the staff manage the squadron taking on a greater level of responsibility and maturity.'

The other student also received an outstanding review: 'She had full responsibility as a Junior NCO for the

management and leadership of over 15 cadets under her command. She continuously performs her duties with dedication, enthusiasm and outstanding professionalism; she is a credit to the Corps and her Squadron and leads by example at all times and this set her apart as a role model to her fellow cadets and she is highly respected by her subordinates and counterparts within the Squadron and beyond. She is always the first to volunteer for any duty and always there to offer advice and guidance to her cadets in her charge. She is also always the last to leave on any duty and has an abundance of enthusiasm which is highly contagious. Her enthusiasm has affected both staff and cadets alike. This cadet is inspirational and is highly respected by her cadets and adult staff



One student sat on the Bexley Youth Council and alongside her fellow members and achieved something that will have a hugely positive impact on our local society. Her supervisor writes: 'She became quite involved with the Bexley Youth Council and had a particular interest in the Legal highs Campaign. She was one of the members who discussed this with James Brokenshire MP and helped to make this act illegal.'

Many students yet again got involved in World Challenge: 'World Challenge was quite hard to reflect on, not because there is not enough to say, but too much. It was great! It was really great and I came back with lots of friends I never thought I'd have, and even a date;). I'm glad to have had this experience, especially now I have paid my parents back the £800 debt.'

'World Challenge was one of the best experiences of my life.'

'This was a great experience for making sure that I appreciate the things that I may take for granted at home.'

'This trip has also motivated me to work hard so that I can achieve everything that I want from my life. Overall, World Challenge is something that I would recommend everyone to do because it was the best month of my life.'

Another student has been committed to Boys' Brigade and has clearly gained as much from them as they have gained from her involvement: 'She has been volunteering at Boys' Brigade working with both the Anchors and Juniors since she was in year 10. She is confident in engaging young people of all ages and leaders in conversation and sharing with them her thoughts and opinions during our community badge work. She engaged in a young leaders weekend for her Queens badge course during which she showed empathy and emotional intelligence when taking part in the conversations and she has visibly growing in confidence in dealing with young people from all backgrounds. She is a valued young leader at the 1st Plumstead.'

Peer Mentor is an extremely valuable role that Sixth Formers are involved in, one of our fantastic students reflects: 'I truly believe that having the role of Peer Mentor has been an invaluable experience, I have always, tried my best, to act with my best interests of the younger student in mind at all times and within the structures set by the school. I am thrilled that, as a Peer Mentor, I have been part of ensuring our school, 'Bexley Grammar', is a happy, secure and enjoyable community for ALL students'.
