Japan Trip for Current Years 9 - 12

The Modern Language Department would like to open up the invitation to all current Year 9 - 12 students who would like to join the trip to Japan from 19th - 30th October 2017. The trip includes sight-seeing in Kyoto, Hiroshima and Tokyo as well as a visit to a prestigious school, Keio High School. In fact, part of the trip will be a homestay in pairs with families from the school (with which we have already forged a connection) so that students can really experience the Japanese way of life. We would hope that you would be able to reciprocate a homestay of a few days the following year, though this is not obligatory and can be discussed at a later date.

This promises to be an incredible opportunity for anyone interested in Japanese culture, or simply travelling - students do not need to be studying Japanese in order to partake. Memories of the School trip to Japan - July 2016

On the 11th July, 11 BGS students in Years 10 - 13, along with Mrs Everett and Mr Martin-Lopez went on a school trip to Japan. Over the thirteen days we were there, we did various activities which enriched our understanding and appreciation of the Japanese culture and of the country itself.

The first four days were spent in the Mie Prefecture, the southern area of the main island of Honshu. During our time there, we visited a local high school: *Kawagoe Prefectural High School*, and we observed the multiple sporting events taking place, as it was their sports day. Afterwards, we participated in a tea ceremony, Karate and calligraphy sessions. We attended the Karate practice session and it was fun. At the end of the day, the host families were kind enough to throw a BBQ party for us.

Other things we did during our stay in the first city include visiting the Nagoya Castle, which dates back to the 17^{th} Century; visiting $-\bar{O}su$, a popular shopping district in Nagoya; and visiting a Ninja museum, where we had the opportunity to attempt shuriken throwing, which is definitely harder than it looks.

The next city we went to was Kyoto, where we stayed at a youth hostel. In the city, a few of us went to the main city during the night to see a famous Gion Festival procession taking place. As Kyoto is renowned for its many temples, we also visited two temples in the area: *Kinkaku-ji* the Golden Temple and *Kiyomizu-dera*, the temple built on a cliff known for its three streams which represents beauty, longevity and wisdom. We also had the opportunity to see traditional performances in a theatre in the Gion District, the most well-known geisha district in Japan.

On one of the days in Kyoto we took a bullet train west to the city of Hiroshima, to donate our 1000 cranes to the Peace Park and visit the War Museum. We also had the lucky opportunity of meeting one of the few remaining atomic bomb survivors, who gave us a presentation and inspired us to strive for a future without conflict.

Our last stop on the trip was the Tokyo metropolitan area. We stayed with the families of our partner students who attend *Keio Shonan Fujisawa High School*, which is one of the prestigious schools in Japan. On one of the days we visited the school. We were given a tour of the sites, as the junior high, senior high and university buildings were on the same campus. Afterwards, we did activities with our partner students, such as calligraphy, participating in a tea ceremony and a traditional card game called "Karuta".

Other places we visited while in the Tokyo area include visiting Asakusa, which has the Sens-ō-ji temple; Harajuku, the area known for its eccentric fashion; and Akihabara Electric Town, a district popular with lovers of anime and manga.

In all, the Japan trip is a trip I definitely recommend going on. It has improved my knowledge in Japanese history and it has offered me an insight into a culture different to that of western countries. This trip is open to students in Years 10 - 12, so make sure you apply for the next one.

There will be 3 levels of language available:

Beginners (suitable for people with little to no experience in the language, or anyone not having taken the course from September): **6.00pm - 7.15pm**

Beginners Plus (suitable for those with basic knowledge - even if from a few/many years ago, or those who took the Beginners course from September): **7.15pm - 8.15pm**

Intermediate (suitable for those with knowledge of tenses and some confidence, but wanting to improve or brush up): **8.15pm - 9.15pm**

The courses will take place on Wednesdays, commencing on the II^{th} January, in the L block (please park in the lower car park or drive around to park in the Le Feuvre playground to ease access during the building works.) This will be an II week course for £135 (not including the half term Wednesday) - cheques made payable directly to the assistants, paid at the first lesson.

Oxford University Computer Science Fair

On a hazy Wednesday morning I woke up at 4.30am, dazed but excited. Today was the day I was going to Oxford University for their Computer Science Fair. I was lucky enough to be chosen by Mr Collins and the Computer Science Department to join a group of 8 students from BGS to attend a fair that was designed to attract young talent in the UK.

At 7.30am we caught a train from Paddington Station to Oxford and from there travelled to the University for a 9.30am start. We arrived and saw what seemed to live up to Oxford's reputation; dreamy spires and old beautiful buildings. We made



our way to the Computer Science Department and quickly got seated in one of their many lecture halls to get a basic understanding of what was going to happen that day. We, and what must have been students from at least five other schools, were greeted by the smiling face and welcoming attitude of Suzanna Marsh, the Communication and Schools Liaison Manager, who was the leader of the session. After a brief talk with her we met Dr Geraint Jones, a Fellow at the University, who introduced Computer Science to us at a theoretical level which was absolutely mind boggling. After he finished his presentation we participated in some practical Computer Science in one of Oxford's many labs where the session was led by one of the Fourth Year students, Sonal Vedi. He introduced us to a program called GeomLab and we were able to play around with that for some time.

After a few more lectures and practical sessions we got to what was, in my opinion, the highlight of the day: a guided tour of one of Oxford's many colleges. This one was Mansfield College, which is one of the smaller colleges, only taking in 70 undergraduates per year, but don't mistake this for being uncomfortable and lesser to any of the other colleges. In fact, during my tour of the building, I was absolutely amazed by the medieval and gothic architecture and was even more amazed at how they managed to seamlessly shift from that to modern and minimalist. Don't even get me started on the Library... it looked as if it was straight out of Hogwarts. With its high gothic style arches and shelves upon shelves of books, you wouldn't be too surprised to find a book of magical incantations or something else like that!

As the day wound down we had one final lecture on Computer Science and Philosophy. It was fascinating and we discussed the nature of genuine intelligence, as well as if machines could (or should) think. We discussed innovations like Google's Deepmind and discussed if it would have any chance at world domination! Eventually, as the saying goes, all good things come to an end. At 6 o'clock we reluctantly left Oxford and made our way home. We were all absolutely shattered after such a long day, but that was nothing a Burger King from Charing Cross Station couldn't fix!
