# BGS presents 'SCHOOL of ROCK'!

The Bexley Grammar School musical production is fast approaching, and this year we are proud to present West End smash-hit SCHOOL OF ROCK. #### **Year 9 German Exchange Trip**

On Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> June, many students on the German side of Year 9 were lucky enough to be able to travel to Germany, Rhineland to be precise. The journey was long (but travelling across the English Channel on an enormous ferry was fun), and I was quite nervous about meeting the people we were going to stay with (this was my first experience of staying with a host family), but we found ways to pass the time (eating, sleeping, playing cards, looking out of the window and taking in our surroundings).

On Wednesday, having had a pleasant night's sleep (meeting the host family and getting settled in wasn't nearly as hard as I'd expected), we met up at our coach and made our way to Cologne. We stopped outside Cologne Cathedral, a towering, gothic structure which acts as a centre for the town. We walked alongside the Rhine down to the chocolate museum, where we learnt lots about how chocolate makes its way from the bean to dark, milk and white chocolate. At the end of our tour, we received a wafer with melted chocolate from a chocolate fountain, and were also taken through a tropical climate room so we could get a feel of the environment in which cocoa beans grow. Next, we travelled up Drachenfels (a very tall hill) by funicular railway, and got to see some breath taking views from the top! Later the same day, we visited the house where Beethoven was born (the ceilings were very low) and we saw some of the instruments Beethoven himself played!

On Thursday, we travelled once more to Cologne, where we received a guided tour of the town. We then were fortunate enough to go on a boat trip along the Rhine, seeing Cologne from yet another angle. A short ride took us to Cologne Zoo, where we were given free rein to look at all the animals, trying to read the information about each animal, which was written in German. When we met up again at the coach, the heavens opened (we got back not a moment too soon!).

Friday saw us go to Phantasialand, a German theme park. I went on lots of rides, and had great fun (even when one of the water rides that I was on broke down just before a big drop!) The attention to detail was amazing in the theme park, with many different zones based on different cultures (including African, China Town and Mystery), and buildings everywhere that really looked the part! Tired and soaking from that one water ride that I loved and went on 5 times, we squelched back to the coach, for the final night with our host families, when we thanked them and packed our bags.

And in no time we were back home! I felt like I'd been away for weeks with everything that'd been packed in! Just like going out to Germany had been weird to start with (walking past people in the street talking German instead of English as we are used to, but also passing English tourists, to really confuse us!), coming back to England felt really odd (back to driving on the left side of the road, being able to speak fully in English etc.) But, around 800 pictures, well over 700 miles of travel just from school to Rhineland and back, lots of German spoken; later, we were back home, really tired with heads spinning with all our new and exciting experiences!

Huge thanks to our kind and welcoming host family who fed us, gave us a place to sleep, and enabled us to practise our German in conversation with German speakers who have no knowledge of English! Great thanks, too, to our coach driver who put up with our noise for the whole trip, took us wherever we needed to go (and back again!), and was so friendly and kind all the time! And most of all, enormous thanks to our teachers (especially Mr Lopez, who organised all this) for taking us on this amazing trip, sorting out everything we need and making everything constant fun! We couldn't have had such a brilliant and valuable experience such as this without them, and we'll remember it forever (in a good way!).

#### **Carnegie Shadowing**








